A Message from Pastor Joel Guttormson...

SUMMER FAITH FORMATION

Faith formation at Salem Lutheran Church does not end on the last day of Sunday School on May 12, 2019. Beginning June 10 – 13 from 9:00 am to 12:00pm we will partner once again with One in Christ for Vacation Bible School. The program takes place at Winnebago Lutheran Church. The theme this year is "Roar! Life is wild, God is good!" Kids will explore God's goodness and celebrate a ferocious faith that powers them through this wild life. Salem currently has five adults and currently four youth who have committed to volunteer. Generally over 100 youth attend culminating with a closing celebration and ice cream social taking place at Salem in the sanctuary on Thursday at 6:00 pm.

Salem will again sponsor the July Jubilee Day camp from July 15th to July 18th from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm with a closing celebration and picnic on Thursday July 18th from 6:00 pm – 7:00 pm. Day Camp is for youth entering grades 1-6 in the 2019-2020 school year, sponsored by Salem Lutheran and funded by help from the Lake Mills Area Ministerial Association (LMAMA). This year the staff of Ingham Okoboji Lutheran Bible Camps will help with the programming. This years theme is "Press on Expedition" based on Philippians 3:13-14, "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus."

Twenty three Confirmation age youth have expressed interest in attending Summer Camp this year at either Riverside, Good Earth, Ingham-Okoboji or EWALU. With generous donations, help from Salem's Enduring Gifts Funds and Youth Fundraisers, every attempt is made to provide scholarships. To receive a scholarship from Salem, parents are asked to register their youth at the camp of their choosing; pay the deposit fee and provide a copy of the registration to the church office.

One confirmation student is planning on attending WIYLDE, June 16-19 at Wartburg in Waverly. This annual camp is sponsored by the Northeastern Iowa Synod and designed to help high school youth learn how to become future leaders of the church. This year's WIYLDE will focus on baptism and the promises that students make during their affirmation of baptism. Guest

teachers, small group and large group Bible studies, learning sessions, games and more will help us focus on our baptismal promises.

Finally, two youth from Salem will be joining Pastor Joel and Nancy, along with one youth from One in Christ and one youth from Good Shepherd Lutheran in Wells MN, July 19-28 on a servant trip to Savannah Georgia. Participants from across the country come together to serve individuals and communities in home repair and community service. Serving alongside individuals from different Christian denominations offering a new understanding of service, building strong, long-lasting relationships and the chance to and deeper faith in Jesus by serving others.

We are truly blessed at Salem to provide so many opportunities for summer faith formation for all ages to youth from Salem and throughout the community. If you would still like to provide a monetary gift to scholarship any of these youth activities; checks made out to Salem Lutheran with Summer Youth Activities in the memo line will help us keep this ministry going. CONFIRMATION FAITH STATEMENTS

Eleven youth affirmed their baptisms on May 5, 2019. They all read their faith statements at the Confirmation Banquet the Wednesday prior to the Sunday they are Confirmed. Excerpts of their faith statements become part of the sermon that Sunday.

Tasha writes, Let's start at the beginning. When I was a little girl I remember going to church, Sunday school, and vacation bible school. I would listen to these stories and I found them interesting, but I never completely understood them. When my grandpa passed away we quit going to church and I got angry with God. I was losing my faith and I was struggling with coping. My faith had hit rock bottom. Once I started confirmation, going back to church and my youth group, I found a bible verse that now I live by, Psalm 71:5, "O Lord you alone are my hope." When everything is going wrong, I always know that he will be there, and he will be my hope. Throughout this past year I have felt really close to God. I have seen the good he can do. I have been relying and talking to him a lot lately. He has given me strength. God wants to help, we just have to let him in. I took me a while to understand that, but now I under-

stand that he is always there to help us.

Kelsey writes: What is faith, what does faith mean to you? Is it church, home, family, or just God/Jesus in general? Faith to me is not just one of those. It is all and even more. Sometimes faith - in other people's eyes - means being the "perfect Christian." To me a perfect Christian means that if you miss a few Sundays at church God will still love you, if you sin a little more than others he will still forgive. It's not going every week or remembering exactly everything your pastor has said in the past. It's about how you receive and share God's love. In these past two years of Confirmation I've gotten the chance to see how others view God and even how they worship him, which is cool because we are all doing the same thing but in different ways.

And from Ella: Is faith something that is there to begin with, or do you have to create it? I personally think that faith comes with having trust and not question what God has planned for you. That is the hardest think you can do but you have to know that trusting God can help in whatever you chose. I need to remember that God is here and will always be here for us. Whenever you believe and you can't do something, take a deep breath, and think of God helping you. Stay confident with that trust.

Nora shared: My faith revolves around the people who support me in all I do like my family and my friends but all in all, God. He's there no matter what, whether you're in danger or accomplishing your greatest achievement. He'll always be your number one supporter in life, even if you don't feel his presence. When I think about how my faith has grown, I think back to the past few summers at bible camp. I made new friends and grew in my faith. Because of these camp experiences my faith family has grown. I run into friends I made at camp at different school events and we talk as if no time has passed and we cheer each other on even though we are on opposing teams. To me, belonging isn't about our particular race, religion, or how talented we might be at something but instead how everyone is equal in the eyes of the Lord. We are a large family. God thinks we are all special and we are all put on this earth for a very special purpose. We may not know what that reason is and may spend a long time trying to figure it out, but our purpose should be to serve God, and in some way leave some good behind.

Alex writes: I think faith is something that is developed over time, it's not something you can instantly acquire. It's something that can be influenced by

family and friends and can play into many more things than just church and your relationship with God. Faith plays a role in sports, school and friendships; in sports because you need to have faith in your teammates. If you don't believe in them, you won't be a good team together. You need to trust your training and how you have practiced because if you don't do what your taught, chances are you will not be successful. In school it's how you learn and knowing what you have learned. When you are tested you need to have faith in what the teacher taught you and you need to use it. The biggest reason faith is in my life is because of family and friends. I think faith in your family and friends is important because these are the people you need to trust at all times. I understand if I need this support from others, I also need to have the courage to offer this to others so they can trust me and be able to rely on me at all times.

Anna chose Psalm 46:1 for her confirmation verse, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." She spoke of the symbols on her stole. The first symbol is a bible, which reminds us that everything in the bible was God's own doing and that God has a plan for everything that happened. And I believe God still has a plan for everyone and that he hasn't left us, nor has he given us away to the temptation of sin. He is simply waiting for the perfect opportunity to help the world the best he can. Anna's second symbol is a pink coffee cup that says, "All I need today is a little bit of coffee and a whole lot of Jesus" Which represents that God is always present and by our side. Whether that be in the morning, afternoon or evening time.

Thea writes: Faith means that God is always there for me when I need him. My faith has grown so much in the past two years because of Confirmation and Bible Camp. In confirmation I learned to trust in God and to try to be the kind of person he wants be to be. I haven't just learned about God but I have also learned how to give back to my community. Through the food drives, and making things such as backpacks and bathroom necessities for those who are in need, I feel better about myself knowing I did something for people who are in need. I don't know what my future holds for me, but I do know that God is going to be with me. In the future I am going to help within my community and mu church as much as I can. No matter where I am, I know that God has a plan for me and that I need to trust in him. Thank you Pastor Joel, Pastor Melinda and Pastor Scott for showing me that faith isn't just about now God

created the world and how he created us. Now I know that God is so much more and he will continue to be an important part in my life.

The verse Morgan chose that gives her hope for the future is, "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever" She writes: this was one of my grandma's favorite bible verses. She passed away on May 5, 2014 and she always believed in God. Inside one of her bibles was a bookmark that had my grandma's favorite Psalm on it. As I read it, I felt like is was meant for me to find, like it was a message from grandma. The message affected me for a long time and is now my favorite verse in the bible. I believe that God has a plan for me too. He has sent many people who love and care for me and they will do whatever they can to help prepare me for the future. I would have never known about God if it weren't for my mom and dad who made sure to bring me to church and teach me all the things that God has done for us. I hope one day I can also pass down my stories about God. Confirmation has helped me make new friends, and also helped me open my eyes a bit more about God. After confirmation I still plan on going to church to learn more about God and help me have more faith in him. Hopefully one day there will finally be peace on earth.

Karli writes: I believe that Jesus is important in my life because he has shown that everything should be done with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness and gentleness. If Jesus were not important, I would not have these things in my life. I believe without these things and without God, my life would be dull and dark. Though I do not know where my future is and where my life will take me, I do believe God has a plan for me. I do believe that we live our life according to God's plan for us and eventually we will see what that plan is. How have I lived my faith so far? When I was little I said a bedtime prayer every night. I started Sunday school when I was 4 years old. My mom was a Sunday school teacher and served on church boards, that showed me the need to serve the Lord. My Grandpa Bruce was diagnosed with cancer in July 2016 and passed away that December. This was a very difficult time for my family and I. It challenged my faith and relationship with God, I was mad at God because he just kept getting sicker and we knew there was no cure. Yet my faith grew stronger during this time because I knew God had a plan for us.

Josie writes: What does confirmation in Christ mean to you, for me it means that you are accepting God's love and that you understand what he did for us. For my verse I have chosen, 1 John 4:19 "We love because he loved us first." When I first read this verse I had to take a second to and think about what I had first read, because its true. I chose it because if he had not left us and if he had not died for our sins, this world would not be a good place, it would be a sad place. A world full of sad people and people who would just steal things and filled with not very nice people. The world would probably be a very bad place. When I went to Riverside last year for the first time I had so much fun and they made learning about God so relatable. After I got back I started to want to learn more and wanted to read the bible and talk to God. I have never been comfortable talking about God and after Riverside I am not as shy at it. I the future I hope that I will be more open to it.

Finally we hear from Kadence: When I think of the word of faith, I think of how somehow someone feels towards God. For the longest time, I never really understood what everyone meant by "your faith." for me, all I needed to know was that God created the world, he sent his only son, Jesus Christ, down from heaven, and then died on a cross for our sins. But through my two years in confirmation, I realized faith is so much more. Praying was never apart of my daily life until a few months ago. Sometimes I felt like I had no one to turn to. So I started talking to God about it in prayer. It was so easy to talk to him about the things on my mind because I didn't have the fear of being judged. Since then, I try to pray as much as possible because it helps me feel less stressed. Something that really helped me was Bible Camp. As I was there, I learned that everyone's faith is different. Some people's faith is stronger compared to others, and that's ok. Everyone has gone through something in their life and I think that the experiences that people go through, has an influence on how people view God. So in the end, you're probably wondering, what does faith mean to me? Well, my faith is my trust in God. That no matter what, he will always love me. Through my mistakes and sins, he will always forgive me. Having faith in him, knowing that he has a plan for me, is one of the best feelings ever.

THE PRACTICE OF STEWARDSHIP: A SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE IN RESPONSE TO GOD'S GRACE

The practice of stewardship begins with hearing the Good News of Jesus

Christ. It is the power of the Holy Spirit working through Word and Sacrament that changes our hearts and wills so that we become the generous children of God. The practice of stewardship continues by providing opportunities for people to live out their faithful and joyful response to the Good News of Jesus. Stewardship is everything that we do after we say, "I believe".

The practice of stewardship involves the way we speak of Jesus and our faith. Paul says that we are "stewards of the mysteries of God" which have been revealed in Jesus. As good stewards of the Good News of Jesus we speak confidently, yet humbly, of what Jesus has done for the world and for us. Our participation in worship and the Eucharist "proclaims the death of Jesus until he comes again".

The practice of stewardship involves the way we devote our time and energy in daily life to God by serving others. As we are faithful in our vocations (family, citizen, job, member of a congregation, student, friend, etc.), we serve God with our activities of daily living, some of which occur within the congregation, but most of which occur outside of our congregation. The practice of stewardship involves the way we care for the earth. As people who share in dominion over the earth, we exercise responsible and careful management of the earth's resources. We value the creation not only for its usefulness to us, but also for God's evaluation that it is "very good".

The practice of stewardship involves the way we manage our financial resources. As people who have received all things as gifts from God, including personal talents, skills, interests, and the ability and desire to develop these, we share a portion of what we have been given with others. Proportionate giving has been the Biblical way of determining how much we are going to faithfully manage for the benefit of our own lives and how much we are going to faithfully and generously give away for the benefit of others and the proclamation of the Good News of Jesus. We seek to grow in giving to and through the tithe (10% of our income).

Salem Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes

Monday May 13, 2019 – 5:30 pm

President Brad Evenson called the meeting to order at 5:30pm.

Members present: Shannon Bruhns, Brad Evenson, Willie Skellenger, Stephanie Steffens, Mike Swenson, Pastor Melinda McCluskey and Cindy Haugsdal

Absent: Pastor Joel Guttormson (continuing education), Delane Behr, Ashley Hoffman, Sondra Nelson (arrived later).

Guest: Keith Johnson

Devotions and Prayers: Pastor Melinda led us in devotions and prayer.

Secretary's Report: The April council meeting minutes have been submitted with no corrections. A motion was made by Shannon, seconded by Stephanie to accept the minutes of the April council meeting. All approved.

Communication and Correspondence: Cindy read a thank you note from the family of Marilyn Gesme and gift of \$200 to Salem. Marilyn Gesme funeral was held at Salem during the snow/ice storm. Thank you from LMHS After Prom students and parents for donation.

Treasurer's Report: Mike provided a written report

Total income for the month \$33,175.49. Expenditures \$27,480.43. Checking account balance \$41,830.67 Heating Project balance \$98,505.23 – Derald Kloster has contacted Johnson Heating to schedule beginning the project soon. \$25,000 CD renewed for 3 months.

Financial Secretary's Report: A written report of the general offering contributions for the month of February. February total general offering contributions were \$24,277. A motion was made by Stephanie and seconded by Willie to accept the treasurer and financial secretary reports as written. All approved.

Board Reports

Board of Worship and Music: Shannon provided a written/verbal report. This report included Lenten reflections, April services, and plans for May/June ser-

vices. Work continues on bulletin lay-out, board of music and worship handbook and training for ushers/communion servers.

Board of Life & Growth / Board of Stewardship and Social Ministry: Willie provided a verbal report. This committee continues to work on Salem baptismal display for the celebration this summer. They are also working on developing service groups that will include all members at Salem.

Board of Property and Management: Delane was absent/no report. A list of property issues addressed by Lyle and OrLoue Thomson was presented by Brad Evenson. There was also discussion regarding installing a camera inside the west door near the chapel to allow the office secretary and staff to see when someone has entered the building. Brad will check into options, costs, etc.

Board of Youth: Sondra and Jennifer provided a written report. April events included Pen Pal meet and greet, Easter breakfast and egg hunt, Lenten suppers, First communion/Faith Statement night, gifts for confirmation, and fundraising for Savannah. Graduation reception and gifts for seniors scheduled on May 19th at 9:30 am in the fellowship hall. VBS is the week of June 10th . Ingham-Okoboji summer camp at Salem will be the week of July 15th . Looking for another board to host the Easter Breakfast in the future, Youth/Education board will still host the Egg Hunt.

Pastor Reports

Lead Pastor's Report: Pastor Joel shared a written report which includes a list of Pastoral acts in April. Pastor Joel's report also included: reflections following the congregational vote, temporary security measures, review/reminder of Salem's ministry site profile and pastor's letter of call to Pastor Joel when he was called to Salem. Pastor Joel also provided all council members with a copy of the book, "The Corporate Person" by Harold Everson. Everson directed the Board Development Services program for the ELCA Division of Church and Society. This book is intended to "help boards discover their own culture, offering guidance on the nature of corporate behavior and reflecting on boards roles, functions, and basic responsibilities." The council will begin discussing the questions at the end of each chapter beginning in June. Stewardship processes that had previously presented to the council were provided for all council members, including a Congregation Stewardship Ministry Conversation/Assessment tool – "Building Generosity".

Associate Pastor's Report: Pastor Melinda submitted a written/verbal report which includes a list of Pastoral acts in April. Pastor Melinda reviewed her call to Salem. She was called for two thirds time. The expectation is that the associate pastor will be actively engaged in the ministry at Salem on Sundays (primarily mornings), Wednesdays (primarily afternoons and evenings), and two other full days (full morning and afternoon) or (full afternoon and evening) during the week – Tuesday and Thursday. The associate pastor will preach approximately once a month at both the Sunday and weekday (now Saturday) services and be available when the lead pastor is away. Pastor Melinda and Pastor Joel jointly provide monthly worship services to the Lake Mills Care Center and Assisted Living Facilities. Pastor Melinda is on call on Mondays (Pastor Joel's day off) and is off on Fridays. There are exceptions with funeral needs. Monthly Pastor reports are kept in a binder in the church office – members are encouraged to review these reports to keep up with the ministry of our Pastors!

Communication Director: No Report.

A motion was made by Mike, seconded by Shannon to accept all Board/Pastor reports as presented. All approved.

Old Business: Outreach Newsletter – May Outreach was sent out and in member homes on May 1. Security Lockdown was discussed and will be lifted at this time. The West door near the chapel/church office will be open from 9:00 – 5:00 on Monday – Friday, closed for lunch from 12:00 – 1:00. All other doors will be locked unless there are scheduled events. On Sunday, all doors will be open for services. This discussion resulted in the need to develop an inventory of keys and key assignments.

New Business: Keith Johnson presented strategies that he and Becky have experienced at Cross of Christ Church (ELCA) in Arizona the last 2 winters. They found this church very welcoming and comfortable. Recommendations included: Sharing the peace/greeting others after announcements rather than later in the service; bulletin included a page for those attending to "connect" with the church – name, phone, special prayer concerns, membership/guest status, etc.; church addressed envelope in every bulletin for communication/offering. The council thanked Keith for sharing this positive experience and will take these ideas into consideration.

Statistical adjustment – Rhonda Rosen

A motion was made by Mike, seconded by Shannon to approve the statistical adjustment. All approved. We closed with the Lord’s Prayer.

Motion to adjourn made by Stephanie, seconded by Mike. All Approved. The meeting was adjourned.
