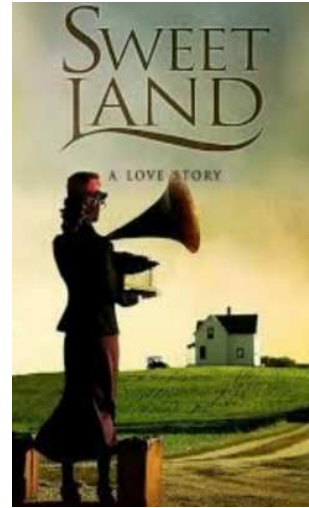

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A Message from Pastor Joel Guttormson...

THEATER AND THEOLOGY: A LOOK AT CHANGING VIEWS OF MARRIAGE AND IMMIGRATION



We will be previewing the movie, Sweet Land, A Love Story on Friday, September 27 in Salem's Chapel at 10:00 am and 7:00 pm. Sweet Land is a 2005 American independent film written and directed by Ali Selim. It is an adaptation of the 1989 short story "A Gravestone Made of Wheat" by Will Weaver. Both the book and the movie received a number of awards, including the Minnesota Book Award for Fiction and Independent Spirit Award for Best First Feature.

It's a story about Inge, a feisty German mail-order bride who has come to Minnesota to marry Olaf, a young Norwegian immigrant farmer of few words. But in a post-WWI, anti-German climate, the local minister openly forbid the marriage. Inge and Olaf fall in love despite the town's disapproval. But when the town banker attempts for foreclose on the farm of Olaf's friend Frandsen, Olaf takes a stand and the community unites around the young couple, finally accepting Inge as one of their own.

This is one of my family's favorite movies, maybe because it reflects so much of the complexity of small-town life and honoring our values of the church and ethnic identity from which we were raised. The author of the book, Will Weaver, was raised on a dairy farm near Park Rapids, where his parents, who were of Scandinavian descent, farmed 150 acres. He taught school in Park Rapids for a time and went on to teach creative writing at Bemidji State University. He has a gift for describing the true to life emotions of how individuals and communities come to terms with global issues of conflict

searching for some resolution. The movie, like my experience, shows that in times of adversity, love and compassion wins out.

At Salem we, like many churches, have been challenged by changing views of marriage and immigration. For some the, biblical view is clear and unchanging, supported by cultural norms and practices that have remained constant for generations. For others the biblical story has never been uniform for every people in every place and time. I am not aware of any faith communities that still uphold the obligation of levirate marriage in which the brother of a deceased man is obligated to marry his brother's widow.

Throughout Israel's history monogamy was not considered a normative ideal. King Solomon was reported to have 700 wives and 300 concubines, and he was known for his surpassing wisdom! Today most would agree that sounds sort of crazy. The prophet Ezra was appalled by the abomination of the taking of foreign wives, defiling the purity of their calling as a holy people. Yet, the story of Ruth seems to provide another perspective of a love that transcends cultural norms, race and religion. We find in the scriptures, as in our own lives, there are often more than one perspective and the path forward is never straight and clear.

Flood buckets contain essential cleaning supplies to help people clean up their homes and businesses following a flooding disaster.

In 2017, the Northeastern Iowa Synod's Disaster Response Network invited congregations to bring flood buckets to the 2017 Synod Assembly in Decorah. Congregations responded by bringing 150 flood buckets!

In addition, St. John Lutheran, Cedar Falls, donated 150 flood buckets to celebrate the congregation's 150th anniversary. Other congregations have also reached out to help neighboring communities affected by flooding.

The flood buckets have been stored at Glenwood Lutheran, Decorah; Grace Lutheran, Tripoli; and the Cerro Gordo County Emergency Management, Mason City.

In little more than a year, more than 200 of the buckets have been used for clean up after flooding in Sumner and Mason City.

You can help replenish the synod's supply of buckets, so that we can remain ready to respond when flooding occurs again in Northeastern Iowa.

HOW TO MAKE A FLOOD BUCKET

Each flood bucket must be assembled according to the instructions below, with all items listed. The value of each flood bucket is approximately \$60.

BUCKET CONTENTS:

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (if bucket has been used, clean well but do not use if it has held chemicals of any kind.)
- Four scouring pads
- One scrub brush
- Five dust masks
- Seven sponges, assorted sizes (at least one fairly hefty for washing mold)
- 18 cleaning towels (reusable, like Easy Wipes[®])
- One 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner (like Lysol[®])
- One 25 oz. bottle liquid disinfectant dish soap (like Dawn[®])
- One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottles of liquid laundry detergent
- One package of 48-50 clothespins
- Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- Two pairs latex gloves (long heavy-duty, like Playtex[®] dishwashing gloves, not the thin ones sold for painting etc.)
- One pair work gloves
- 28-bag roll of heavy-duty trash bags (30-45 gallon)

ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS:

All cleaning items must be new — all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened.

Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape.

Please Note: Do NOT substitute items, add items, or leave items out of the buckets. If the requested item size is not available, go down to the next available size.

Suggestions from Lutheran Disaster Response: Many items can be purchased at local dollar stores at a substantial savings. The Lysol cleaner can be difficult to find — be sure it is a concentrated formula.

If items are in boxes (like the trash bags), the box can be removed to conserve space in the bucket. Packaging from the dust masks can also be removed and the mask placed in a zip lock bag.

You are encouraged to add to the bucket a personal note wishing the owner well, identifying the congregation where the bucket came from, etc.

This can be taped to the exterior of the bucket.

The next **Noisy Offering** collection will go to the **Feed My Starving Children** packing event which will be October 26th at the CVR event center in Osage. **Collection Sunday is September 15th.**



Our denomination, the ELCA, holds a churchwide assembly triennially - to worship, vote on matters of governance and policy, and be church together for the sake of the world. This past week's churchwide assembly was full of important votes and actions, including:

- Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton was reelected for a second six-year term on the first ballot.
- A declaration of apology to our siblings of African descent, which was received by the African Descent Lutheran Association with thanks and a call for accountability and living into the words shared.
- Approved resolution declaring the ELCA is a "sanctuary church body," encouraging participation in the ELCA AMMPARO initiative for migrant children, discernment of care for our immigrant neighbors in our context, and the promise of forthcoming resources for this work.
- Approved support for the World Council of Church's *Thursdays in Black*, awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Voted to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance, in honor and remembrance of the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9.
- Approved a declaration for inter-religious commitment, reaffirming ecumenical and interfaith partnerships.
- Approved the recommendations from a strategic taskforce which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church.
- Approved memorials: affirming but not "endorsing" the Poor People's Campaign, care for immigrants and refugees, and other statements.
- Adopted a new social statement, "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions.
- Deacon Sue Rothmeyer was elected Churchwide Secretary, a full-time position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of word and service) to be ordained, from the previous practice of consecration.
- Celebrated the milestones of 50 years of women's ordination, 40 years since the first woman of color was ordained, and 10 years since full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ clergy.

Devotions and Prayers: Pastor Joel led us in devotion and prayer.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made by Mike, seconded by Sondra to accept the minutes of the previous meeting as written. All approved.

Communication and Correspondence: None

Treasurer's Report: Mike provided a written report. Total income for the month \$25,957.07. Expenditures \$27,343.78. Checking account balance \$32,332.63. Heating Project balance \$93,055.23.

Financial Secretary's Report: Sondra provided a written report – Total offering year-to-date as of 7/31/2019 \$152,489.

A motion was made by Cindy, seconded by Willie to accept the treasurer and financial secretary reports as written. All approved.

Board Reports

Board of Worship and Music: Shannon provided a written report. The board is thankful for members who have volunteered to usher/serve communion after need communicated. The usher and acolyte duties are being updated. Acolyte training is scheduled Wednesday, August 28 and usher training is scheduled on Sunday, Sept. 8. Planning continues for future services this year.

Board of Life and Growth / Board of Stewardship and Social Ministry: Willie provided a verbal report. "I do, I do" Wedding dress event was sold out, 200 tickets sold with total profit of \$2,683.95. The profit will be divided (approximately \$500 each) as follows: #1 Drinking fountain at LMCPD; #2 Bench on walking path by the LMHS Football Field; #3 Replace chaise lounge chairs at the LM Aquatic Center; #4 Remaining funds will be donated to Salem.

September 8 is Heritage Sunday and Rally Sunday with a Church cookbook Potluck; Noisy offering for September 15 is for Feeding my Starving Children; Packing event for Flood buckets – Board received a \$250 grant from Thrivent for supplies; September 22 – Lutheran World relief.

Board of Property and Management: No report.

Board of Youth: Marcie and Jennifer provided a verbal report. The board is recruiting teachers for Faith Formation; Rally Sunday is September 8; Planning to review the Youth Scholarship/Funding process with a focus on encouraging student involvement in fundraising events.

Pastor Reports – Complete Pastor reports are available for review in the church office.

Lead Pastor’s Report: Pastor Joel shared a written/verbal report. Written report included Pastoral acts for July; Pastoral visits and future plan for tracking; July Jubilee Day camp review; Upcoming Baptisms outside Salem worship; Designated giving to LGBTQ education; Possible Building use inquiry – Country View Acres (Wedding venue) requesting wedding backup and/or winter month ceremony site. Council had lengthy discussion regarding the following issues from the Pastor’s report. Possible building use was tabled to the next council meeting.

UPCOMING BAPTISM: I was asked by three families, Jerod & Kari Osheim, Chalsea (Harmon) & Drew Roder and Ashley & Spenser Brackey if I would be willing to baptize their children, Cash Osheim (July 12, 2019) Peyton Roder (April 16, 2019) and Emily “Emmy” Brackey (March 12, 2019) Saturday, August 24th 2014 at the home of Craig & Cindy Haugsdal. It is not common practice in our Lutheran tradition to have the baptism outside of the regular worship. I met with the families on May 8th to show a video on baptism by my former professor Winston Presaud who talks about the differences between a “personal” and a “impersonal” and the “private” and “public” nature of the sacrament. There is a commitment made by pastors, families, sponsors, and congregation to keep sacred promises, “to live among God’s faithful people, bring them to the word of God and the holy supper, teach them the Lord’s Prayer, the Creed and the Ten Commandments, place in their hands the holy scriptures, nurture them in faith and prayer, so that they may learn to trust God and proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world

God made and word for justice and peace.” It’s hard to do that without community, however broken or imperfect.

The struggle for these three families is that Chalsea’s brother Derrick (a baptized child of God of this congregation) and his partner Jèsus will be sponsors and since the vote to exclude them from the opportunity of marriage in the sanctuary, these three families have felt in many ways shunned or excluded and would feel there would be a lack of integrity with the congregational response of welcome concluding the baptism, “We welcome you into the body of Christ and into the mission we share: join us in giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God’s creative and redeeming word to all the world.” Having bylaws that exclude people in LGBTQ community, affect our families and supporters and has these kinds of consequences.

DESIGNATED GIVING TO LGBTQ EDUCATION

Salem has received two donations of \$150, designated to be used to increase support and awareness of LGBTQ issues. I have been thinking about and previewing some resources that might be helpful.

POSSIBLE BUILDING USE INQUIRY

Helen forwarded an email from Sara Brackey with a request; “We own Country View Acres (wedding venue) and have had some couples ask about area churches as a backup for weather or during winter months. We are wondering if this is an option and what you would charge as well as what your capacity is. Saturday weddings are usually at 4 or 5:00. They would provide their own pastor. If this is not an option, that is fine too:) Thank you!”

Sara made the same request to Winnebago and I talked to Pastor Bill Peters, who like me have a number of questions and reservations.

* Who would set the price for the use of the building use? Country View Acres is not a non-profit and any income given to us would be considered taxable income by the IRS.

* One of the first questions I ask of couples who request me to preside at their weddings is, do you want a church wedding or to be married in a church? If they don’t see a distinction, I take the time to explain the difference. Those who choose to be married at Country View Acres have already made that choice. They for whatever reason have chosen to be married at a wedding

venue.

* Couples book their weddings at Country View up to a year in advance. What would be the formal expectation that churches be available on those dates. Would Salem need to have those weddings listed tentatively on our calendar as well?

* Not all who preside at weddings at Country View Acres are pastors or clergy who recognize the ELCA and its clergy. Sharing in the formal status of pulpit and altar fellowship with the ELCA are the Presbyterian Church (USA), Reformed Church in America, United Church of Christ, The Episcopal Church, The Moravian Church, and the United Methodist Church. These are called CCM or Call to Common Mission churches. It's confusing and has a long history, but currently the NALC, LCMC, the Missouri Synod, Wisconsin Synod, Synod, Evangelical Lutheran, Lutheran Brethren, and Lutheran Free are not in "full-communion" with the ELCA or CCM member churches.

Associate Pastor's Report: Pastor Melinda submitted a written report. Written report included Pastoral acts for July; Pastor Melinda is on vacation through 08/14/2019.

Communication Director: No report

A motion was made by Mike, seconded by Sondra to accept all board/Pastor reports as presented. All approved.

Old Business:

Stewardship Progress – Committee (Sondra, Keith Johnson, Mike Swenson, Harris Honsey, Dan Rice, Wayne Van Veldhuizen, and Marie Menke) has met and is working with Mark Anderson from the synod to develop a stewardship campaign. Consecration Sunday is scheduled for 10/6/2019.

Synod Benevolence – Being addressed as part of Stewardship campaign.

Good Samaritan Committee – Tabled to next meeting.

New Business:

Enduring Gift Fund Progress – EGF committee has consulted with an attorney regarding changes in EGF to make it possible to use the principal as well as the interest for special circumstances. EGF committee would like to meet with council to review this information. Discussed that this change would need to

be addressed at a congregational meeting/vote with a 60-day notice.

Transfer: Frank and JoAnn Ostby to Swedesburg Evangelical Lutheran Church, Swedesburg, IA. A motion was made by Mike, seconded by Willie to approve the transfer. All approved.

We closed with the Lord's Prayer. Motion to adjourn made by Sondra, seconded by Mike. All Approved. The meeting was adjourned. Our next regular meeting will be Monday, September 9, 2019.
