School Kits: Education is important for any community, especially where poverty or disaster has limited the options for young people to reach their potential. School Kits contain essential supplies to help children—and in some cases, adults—continue their learning despite the hardships they face. And that learning leads to a better life for them, their families and their communities.

Salem will be collecting School Kits and supplies to make the kits. Donations can be left in the Narthex.

INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN EACH FABRIC KIT:

*Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide or college-ruled paper approximately 8"x 10¹/₂"; no loose-leaf paper.

*One 30-centimeter ruler, or ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

*Five ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band

*Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band

*One box of 16 or 24 crayons

*One pencil sharpener

*One eraser

*One 30-centimeter ruler, or ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

*One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

*One sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14"x 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks); recommended fabric include heavy cotton, canvas, denim or twill



Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Remove any excess packaging, pack all items in the bag and close. Do not enclose the kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

NEW AND RENEWING MEMBERSHIP CLASSES

There will be another opportunity to participate in a New and Renewing Membership Class in August. Classes will be offered Sunday, **August 14 and 21 from 10:30 – 11:30** in the chapel. A lunch will be served following the classes in the lounge.

Three ELCA publications will be used for our discussion, “Honoring Our Neighbors Faith,” “Baptized We Live: Lutheranism as a way of life,” and “Called Forward Together in Christ: ELCA Future Directions 2015.” These three documents provide a roadmap of sorts helping us discern together how Lutherans are similar to other Christian traditions and yet distinct in some significant and important ways. “ELCA Strategic Directions 2025 tells the story of the church we are becoming – a church that is confident about who we are in Christ and what God is calling us to do. The directions are presented in three parts: 1. The ELCA – who we are; 2. What unites us as a Church; and 3. Our goals and priorities” (p.4 Together in Christ).

That the ELCA has a document entitled “Honoring Our Neighbors Faith” says a lot about how we view ecumenical partners in our denomination. “Baptized We Live” provides a look at our Lutheran heritage as a way of “seeing, hearing, teaching and following,” that both grounds us and sets us apart from others. “Together in Christ,” boldly envisions a future church that is connected, thriving, relevant, relational, vocational, welcoming, ecumenical, well-governed, and sustainable.

Why attend a new and renewing membership classes? Past attendees learned that we all come from differing backgrounds and have different faith stories, and that’s okay, in fact it’s an asset to a healthy, diverse, dynamic congregation. We give thanks for the stories of “lifelong Lutherans” who can share our cultural roots. We also want to invite, hear from, and welcome to the conversation those who have come from other faith traditions or spiritual paths. It’s also important for new and renewing members to get to know each other and have a common aspiration, that Salem’s mission and ministry makes a difference in Lake Mills and beyond.

The milestones of baptism, faith formation, first communion, affirmation of baptism, weddings and funerals and all other celebrations that make up the life and ministry of people in this place can only continue with the commitment of active new and renewing members. As a new and renewing member, honoring our individual and collective past, keeping our baptismal and affirmation of baptism calling is a lifelong gift of grace and commitment:

- to live among God's faithful people,
- to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,
- to proclaim the good news of God in Christ Jesus
- and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

Whether a life-long, seasoned, new, discerning, or questioning person, this class offers an opportunity for conversations about why membership at Salem matters. If you know someone who is new or inactive participating in new and renewing membership classes is an opportunity to join in the conversation. For those who attend the classes and desire to become "Confirmed" members of Salem, their names will be brought to the Church Council for a vote on September 8. A new and renewing member reception is scheduled for Rally Sunday, September 18th.

Copies of the three resources used for class discussion and a sign-up sheet are in the Narthex. Please sign up or call the church office if you plan to attend so we can have enough books and know how much food to prepare for the lunch following the class. We hope to see you there!

What Prayer Is and How It Works

Smith Wigglesworth was a great preacher. But before he was a preacher, he was a plumber who wasn't a Christian—nor a very nice man.

Fortunately for him, he had a godly wife.

He didn't want her to go to church, but she went anyway. When she did, he'd lock her out of the house, and when she came home, she'd have to sleep on the back porch. In the morning he'd unlock the door and she'd come in and say, "Good morning, Smithy!" and make him breakfast.

She was a godly example for him. She prayed for him and God gave her the grace to be good to him in spite of his rude behavior. And because she continued to be so good to him, he eventually came to know the Lord and was radically changed. As a result, he became one of the greatest preachers who ever lived.

That's the power of prayer.

Understand What Prayer Really Is

Prayer is simply conversation with God. It's asking Him to meet your need or someone else's. It's praising Him and thanking Him. It's about committing things to Him and consecrating things to Him. We need to pray about everything and anything.

I think some people don't pray much because they don't understand how powerful prayer really is. The truth is it's one of the greatest privileges we have as Christians.

When we pray, we open the door for God to come into our problems and situations and work on them. Prayer makes us partners with God. And while we can't really change people and make them love God, He can minister to their hearts and reach them.

I also believe that prayer is easier than we think it is. And it can be so much a part of our life that we don't even realize how much we pray – like breathing.

What Makes Prayer So Powerful?

The Bible teaches us in [James 5:16](#) that “the earnest (heartfelt, continued) prayer of a righteous man makes tremendous power available [dynamic in its working].” Prayer is passionate. It’s about sincerity of heart and putting your whole heart into it.

Prayer doesn’t have to be eloquent or long. And prayer isn’t better if it’s loud or if you’re on your knees, folding your hands or bowing your head. It’s good to humble yourself, but it’s not your posture or how long you pray that makes it effective.

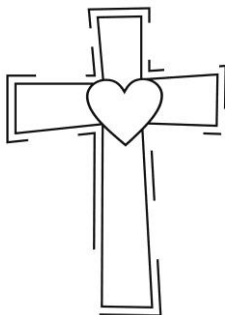
I remember a time when God challenged me to ask for what I wanted and needed in the least amount of words possible. This was hard at first. For example, when we do something wrong, it’s hard just to say, “God, I know that was wrong and I admit it. I ask You to forgive me. Thank You, Lord. Amen.”

Instead, it’s common to hear something like this, “Oh, God! I need You to forgive me. God, forgive me. Please, God, forgive me. Oh God, You’ve got to forgive me! Please, God...I promise not to do it again.”

[Hebrews 11:6](#) says that faith pleases God, and if we believe He exists and seek Him, He will reward us. We don’t have to beg and plead with Him to help us. God is a good God! He loves you and wants what is best for you.

Spend time with God. Talk to Him sincerely and honestly. Cast your cares on Him. Then find out what He wants to do and then follow His lead.
